Hilderstone Parish Council

Chairman's Annual Report.

My second year as chairman of the parish council will soon be complete. The position of clerk for the parish council was filled by a very able Amanda Kingston who knows in some detail what a parish council clerk role is all about and I feel we are lucky to have someone with such knowledge and ability.

With Jean Jones deciding to leave the parish council a vacancy was created. After all proper procedure, rules and regulations were gone through, two people were interested and one by the name of Jim Davies was offered the position as a Stone town councillor and past Mayor of Stone. The councillors thought he would have a lot to offer on the parish council.

Year of Election

This year is an election year to take place in early May. Anyone living in our village or surrounding area, who is on the electoral role is eligible to stand for election for Hilderstone Parish Council. A slot is made on the monthly meeting agenda, for public participation so villagers can have their say and raise issues of concern in the village so please come along to a meeting and see what goes on.

Village Maintenance

Blocked drains and potholes are reported by as many people as possible to the Highways department to give them some idea has to how dangerous they are for cycles, motor bikes and cars alike. Village maintenance is taken care of by Bill Holmes for benches, plant boxes, bus shelters and many other small jobs. Simon Down is called in for tree surgery or tree planting when necessary. Tractor mower contractor mows the Roebuck bank twice a year after the daffodils have finished and ground maintenance contractor is on hand for the verges and road side weed control and other areas when required.

Planning

On a regular occasions plans for development or alteration to village properties come before the parish council, all proposals are carefully considered and a report sent back to the planning department. As councillors we feel sometimes they take no notice of our view what so ever.

Best Kept Village

We continue to subscribe to the competition to help people to have a sense of pride and a goal to aim for in keeping the village clean and tidy, which is pleasing to the eye and gives a sense of pride. My thanks go to those who litter pick and get involved in working parties to keep our village looking at its best.

Traffic

With many new houses being built in local areas it will undoubtedly increase the volume of traffic. There is little we can do about the amount of traffic through the village, but we continually look at ways to control the speed and safety of all those who use our village.

The Roebuck

Eighteen months has passed since the reopening of the village pub. It came as a shock to hear of the sudden death of David Westwood in November last year. Having spoken to his wife, she has made this her home and with village support will keep the Roebuck open for business for years to come.

The Church

This is kept very tidy by a small work force and is moving forward with its planned access for all and disabled toilet facilities. Our vicar Rev. Marion Reynolds has fitted in very well and is well liked.

Village Hall

This well-kept asset is a wonderful venue for many activities. Regularly used and well cared for by the caretaker Mr Wareham.

Village Events

All village events are published in the magazine and on the web site. They include village fete, Christmas party, village concert, film night, bingo, jumble sales and much more, all helping to get villagers involved and bring a community spirit to the village.

Dawn Chorus

May is the month for bird song and I like to get up early for the dawn chorus. Birds use song to attract mates and defend breeding territories; they can sing throughout the day, but dawn is the time when singing is loudest

You can think of the different bird species as players and singers in an orchestra. Thrush and blackbirds start the chorus with a glorious fanfare, imagine soprano and tenor singers at full force! This is followed by a complicated mixture of songs and with patience, you can start to pick out individuals. Warblers such as whitethroat, blackcap and garden warbler have lyrical songs; the violin section. Great spotted woodpeckers can be heard drumming whilst finches include buzzes and chirring sounds in their song, other percussion instruments? Listen for the tit family; loud simple sounds like a trumpet. Goldcrest and tree creeper are often found in churchyards and have high-pitched songs – piccolo players in the background. Finally, green woodpecker with its loud laughing 'yaffle' is an unruly member of the audience!

Many people offer Dawn Chorus walks, sometimes followed by breakfast, which works well in a churchyard setting. International Dawn Chorus day is the first Sunday in May but birds sing throughout the month so any May morning will do!

Fun fact: birds develop regional accents, a nuthatch in Cornwall sounds different from one in Staffordshire.

Cooks Tips

Apple and Ginger Cake

Ingredients

8 oz Cooking apples (peeled weight)

3 oz Butter or margarine

6 oz Golden syrup

4 oz Brown sugar

5 fl oz Milk

1 large egg

8 oz Wholemeal plain flour

Pinch of salt

2 tsp Ground ginger

1 tsp Ground mixed spice

1 tsp Baking powder

1 tsp Bi-carbonate of soda

Method

Pre-heat the oven to 170 degrees, gas 5 and line a 8" round cake tin

Put apples in a pan with 1 tablespoon of water and cook until soft and mushy. Allow to cool slightly, put butter, syrup and sugar into a separate pan and warm gently over a low heat until melted and well blended, cool slightly then beat in milk and egg.

Mix dry ingredients in a bowl, add the syrup mixture and beat well, add stewed apple, beat until well mixed.

Pour mixture into a tin and bake for $1\frac{1}{4}$ - $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours until firm to the touch.

Neighbourhood Watch

Detectives urge residents to be vigilant following national rise in TV licensing

Your latest Smart Alert. Detectives from Staffordshire Police are urging residents to remain vigilant following a national increase in TV licensing scams.

In seven months, residents across Staffordshire have been duped into losing money to a total of over £20,000.

The National Fraud Intelligence Bureau have found that fraudsters are sending members of the public fake TV licensing emails to target their personal and financial information.

Since April 2018, 926 crime reports have been made to Action Fraud, with a total of loss of over £830,000.

In Staffordshire, residents across the county have been tricked into losing money totalling over £20,000.

A total of 44 reports have been received by detectives, with individual losses ranging between £1,325 and £8,000.

Action Fraud has identified that victims receive a TV licensing phishing email with links to a convincing-looking website that steals personal and financial details.

Within a week or two, victims will receive a phone call from someone claiming to be from the fraud department of the victim's bank. The offenders are then able to convince victims they are genuine banking staff by providing some of the personal details that were received using the fake TV licensing emails and websites.

Detective Inspector Robert Harvmann, senior investigating officer in fraud and cyber crime said: "Fraudsters, will try to panic people into action. Always stop and think before sharing any personal data and don't engage with 'cold callers'.

"Anyone who thinks they may have been a victim of fraud or cyber crime should contact Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040.

"Anyone in Staffordshire that feels vulnerable or is able to identify the person they believe is responsible can contact us on 101." If you need to reply regarding this message, click on this email address: nw@staffordshire.pnn.police.uk

From the Vicar

How often do you say the Lord's Prayer? Whether it's several times a day or very infrequently, it is the one prayer that unites Christians worldwide today as it has for the last 2000 years. I think most of us could recite the Lord's Prayer from memory if asked to and it is still taught to the children in some schools. But, how much to we really take on board what we are praying as we recite each petition of the Lord's Prayer? It's a failing we all have, not taking the Lord's Prayer literally, believe in what we are praying and commit to acting out what we are professing.

With this in mind, the Archbishops (Justin and John) have called all Christians to pray the Lord's Prayer over the Pentecost season (Ascension to Pentecost, 5th May to 9th June this year). St Nicholas and Christ Church have embraced this call and, as last year, we are holding a Prayer Morning on Wednesday, 5th June at St Nicholas which I would encourage as many of you as can possibly attend to join. starting at 10:30am. This follows immediately after the deanery Ascension Day service on 30th May which, this year, is being held at Christ Church (see "What's On").

Some people think that you can only pray by saying words with eyes closed, possibly on your knees. There is absolutely nothing wrong with that approach to prayer but .. there can be so many other ways that we can pray, especially through music. Music is in integral way to worship and pray so Christian songs are worship, liturgy, prayer but also story and history (eg telling the gospel story) and testimony. In this regard, have you ever thought how many version of the Lord's Prayer set to music there are? For example, recently I taught the children in school the "Caribbean Lord's Prayer" and they loved it! Sometimes, it is appropriate that we sing/pray rather than say/pray.

We are so very blessed aren't we? Yet we do so take our blessings for granted. How quick we can be to blame God if things don't go the way we want or expect them to go but how slow we are to thank him for all he has, is giving and will give us. Let us then use this opportunity to rethink our praying of this so familiar prayer and just see how it will enrich our lives.

COUNTRYSIDE WATCHER - MAY THE DAWN CHORUS

I am amazed to discover that there are around six hundred different species of birds in the British Isles. Some, of course are just passing through. However, they are all wonderful. Some are beautiful and some have unusual lives.

However, at April and May time, the springtime of the year, it is the Dawn Chorus that is so stunning. It is an unsurpassed entertainment. This bird orchestral experience moves us, softens our hearts, inspires us, relaxes us and can, on special occasions, thrill us. We have to get up early to hear this most beautiful event. It can begin soon after 3 am, but it builds up to a climax. It can be heard anywhere, in gardens, parks, hedgerows, woodland or scrub. All we have to do to rejoice in this event is to listen to it.

We are not certain at the moment why some birds have more complicated songs than others. Some birds also have more melodic songs than others. Some are so tuneful. It is wonderful to listen to the unique song of the Goldfinch. Chaffinches sing too. It is said that some Chaffinches have regional accents. When the Blackcap arrives it adds a fast-flowing bubbling song to the chorus. The Wren has a charming song. The Dunnock sounds like a whiny wheelbarrow. Starlings have their own beautiful song, but they often mimic other songs. However, the Blackbird, the Songster, sings the most superb song of all.

There is also a lovely Dusk Chorus. Then the musical Song Thrushes compete with the beautiful song of the Blackbirds. The Robin's beautiful song can also be heard at dusk. Though we may hear the Robin sing right through the year.

The question is why do birds sing? Many people have been wondering why for centuries. It is certainly not just to give pleasure to us. It is predominantly males who sing to protect their territory. They also wish to protect their babies or raise an alarm. With all the birds, they sing so very well so that they can find a mate, as the usual life of songbirds is very short.

Birds singing can be a chancy situation. Usually, the strongest males have the finest song. It is good if the singing brings a mate. However, it can also attract enemies. The singing also uses much of the bird's energy. So they have to feed often to renew it.

It is a delight to hear the lovely bird song of the Dawn Chorus. Whether it is heard while out in the garden or filtering through the open bedroom window, it is an enchanted annual experience.




