#### Best Kept Village Competition 2019.

A reminder that the judging for the Best Kept Village Competition can take place at anytime in May, June, and July (the dates are not given). April is the time when work to prepare the village for the competition should be well underway.

Private front gardens as well as the public areas of the village are included in the judging. Neat and well maintained front gardens reflect the level of pride and care residents take in the appearance of their village. Everyone can help by weeding/sweeping the pavements in front of your house and for the passionate gardeners among you, an abundance of floral displays often helps impress the judges. Please help keep our village tidy by picking up litter when possible.

The Best Kept Village Competition also includes a children's poster competition for 5 to 11 year olds. Points are received for displaying the posters around the village and for the past few years there has been an excellent display of these in the village bus shelters, supplied by the pupils of Green Lea School. If your child does not attend Green Lea School they can still enter the competition by sending their poster to the Parish Clerk.

The aim of the posters is to encourage local people and visitors to help keep the village clean, tidy and attractive by:

- Not dropping litter/picking litter up.
- 2. Keeping front gardens neat and tidy and attractive (with hanging plant baskets or planters).
- 3. Helping to keep the streets neat and tidy by regular weeding of the pavements immediately in front of their houses.
- 4. Clearing up after their dogs.
- Not vandalising village amenities such as park equipment, notice boards, bus shelters and benches etc.

Posters should be A4 in size. Send your entry to the Parish Clerk **by Thursday 9**<sup>th</sup> **May 2019** making sure that your name, age and address is on the back. The clerk's contact details are at the front of the magazine.

Hilderstone Parish Council will select a winning poster out of each age category and will award a prize to each. These winning entries will also be forwarded to the Community Foundation for Staffordshire for entry into the County Competition. All entries will be displayed around Hilderstone village during the summer.

#### **Dog Fouling**

Please remember that it is an offence to leave dog mess. Parents should remind children that walk the family dog on their own, that they must pick up the poo. Bagged dog mess can be placed in any public waste bin, although the bins in the infant play area should not be used.

If you have information about owners who do not clear up their dog's mess or let them roam loose on a regular basis, please report it to Stafford Borough Council on 01785 619000, email: <a href="mailto:dogs@staffordbc.gov.uk">dogs@staffordbc.gov.uk</a> You can also report on line at <a href="https://www.staffordbc.gov.uk/dogs">https://www.staffordbc.gov.uk/dogs</a> The names of people providing this information will remain confidential. The Borough and Parish Council are determined to stamp out this very anti-social problem and will take every step to identify and fine offenders.

Where evidence of the guilty dog owners can be obtained, a fixed penalty fine of £75 will be issued. Persistent offenders can be prosecuted further with a maximum fine of up to £1000.

#### **Tree Planting Memorial for WW1**

The Parish Council is considering planting seven trees as a memorial to the local fallen soldiers from WW1. # **Honey Oat Yummies**

#### To make 20 yummies you will need

### **Ingredients**

- 4 ounces margarine
- 4 ounces caster sugar
- 2 eggs
- 8 ounces self raising flour
- 2 large teaspoons of set honey
- 2 ounces porridge oats

#### **Method**

Put the margarine, honey and sugar into a bowl and mix well together.

Put in the eggs and mix again.

Sieve the flour into the bowl with the oats and mix very carefully until the flour and oats are all mixed in.

Put large teaspoonfuls onto baking trays spread out a little, to allow for spreading during cooking and cook at gas 4 for about 15 minute

# Ready, Steady ... Go

Just one year ago plans were drawn up for full disabled access to Christ Church Hilderstone. Phase 1, the re-siting of the War Memorial, was completed in time for the special Remembrance Service in November 2018, whilst Phase 2, the re-siting of the Font, was undertaken in February 2019.



And now the main event – Phase 3a – the installation of a graded ramp from the car park to the church, with a new access point for those with wheelchairs or prams from the Bell Tower to the main body of the church, is underway. As I write, we aim to

have this major development well underway by the end of May – so watch this space!

It has been thanks to the generosity and support of the community that we have managed to achieve so much in so short a period of time: not just the fundraising, which was

vital, but also the planning, implementation and, yes, the endless form-filling that needed to be done.

Our fundraising programme continues for the installation of the ramp, plus the next two phases of the project, namely the indoor toilet facilities (no more portaloo!) and then the tea bar, so we can provide refreshments at church events. These two projects will be completed when funds become available, but we are hoping this will be either later in 2019 or early 2020.

The eagle-eyed amongst you may have noticed that our 'Open Church' days have started again, providing an opportunity to visit our Waterloo church, with its rare example of an enamel window (East Window) and its grounds, set in the heart of our lovely rural village. Why not come along and see how our plans for Access for All are going? The 'Open Church' scheme runs throughout the summer months: Saturdays 10am – 5pm; Sundays 12pm – 5pm.

Our beautiful churchyard is also worth a visit, with its lovely views across the fields and tranquil seating areas which are well-maintained by the Churchyard Clean-up Team throughout the year. It is now a year since we set up our Bug Hotel with the Messy Sunday School and our hotel's inhabitants are now settled in and enjoying the churchyard's rich habitat, including our wild flower garden and mature trees.

#### Helping Hedgehogs!

Hedgehogs need help and churchyards can be perfect places for them; containing many features that hedgehogs need. They eat a wide range of things, beetles, worms, slugs and other invertebrates. Churchyards are rich in hedgehog food. They forage in the grassland, the nooks and crannies around monuments, the shady, damp corners with leaf litter and deadwood and amongst the stones of an old wall. Hedgehogs make nests all year round, using them to rear their young hoglets, to hibernate and to shelter during the daytime. Again, churchyards come up trumps with hedgehogs nesting in scrub and bramble patches, at the base of trees and walls and in compost piles. They make a nest from dead leaves, and to the human observer, it looks like a leaf football!

Hedgehogs roam widely, having a nightly circuit of a couple of miles. They <u>can</u> climb over barriers but squeezing through gaps saves energy. Churchyards usually have a several places for a hedgehog to get in and out — again, very helpful. In June hedgehogs are breeding, with hoglets either in the nest or starting to venture out. You can help them by keeping your churchyard chemical free, letting some areas get a little bit wild and allowing gaps for them to get through. Have a look at

hedgehogs@ptes.org to learn more.

Please tell me if you have hedgehogs, look for footprints in mud and droppings. They are probably present without anybody knowing it!

#### From the Vicar

In my lectionary commentary recently the question "how do we avoid falling into the trap of deliberate ignorance of God?" was posed. It went on to say: "It is easier to fall into that trap than we might at first think. The most difficult nuance to grasp is between truth and falsehood in terms of how we might perceive the presence and force of God in our time and in our context. Being exposed to constant reminders not to replace the invisible God with visible emblems of what we might consider to be the truth however attractive — is as good a place as any to begin."

This is such an apt comment as we hear on the news and in our newspapers of yet more instances in which Christians (and many others) are vehemently opposed to legislation currently being enacted by our parliament in our name, to decisions made by the church General Synod, by international events and so on. You, like me, might be very angry at constantly being told that "the British public ..." when I have not been asked for or given my opinion on something. On the other hand, it is very easy for us who call ourselves Christian to quote verses out of context from the Bible to justify our stance on these, and many other, issues.

And that brings us to Ordinary Time. As we leave the triumphant seasons of Easter and Pentecost behind in our liturgical calendar we "go green" for the next 6 months or so in the period we call Ordinary Time. And a more inapt name for a season in the church calendar is hard to think of because ordinary it isn't (or shouldn't be)! So, what is Ordinary Time? It is the time: "when the church particularly tries to absorb the implications of Christ's teaching, with its many-faceted themes". In other words, it is the time when we look at one of the synoptic gospels (Matthew, Mark and Luke) in depth, read about Jesus – what he did, how he acted, how he responded, who he socialised with, his emotions, his anger, his love and so on, in order to interpret what that means for each one of us, his followers today. That overdone adage WWJD (what would Jesus do) springs to mind as we ask ourselves what did each passage mean at the time of Jesus and therefore what does each passage mean to me today; how should I react/respond; how do I apply it to my situation/my life/my work/my community.

This year we are in lectionary year "C" so we are concentrating on Luke's gospel – written by a gentile for gentiles (that's us!). It is the gospel which more so than the others deal with issues so similar to those facing us today – the marginalised, status of women, health and wholeness, fairness and justice. Tom Wright has written a series of books called ".... for everyone" and "Luke for everyone" is an excellent commentary to help you work out what Jesus, through Luke is saying to you today; I recommend it to you.

The evening finished at 12.30 though I believe partying for some continued elsewhere.


