<u>Hilderstone Heritage, Part Twenty-Six</u>

'The Staffordshire Weekly Sentinel' of 12th November 1954 featured a full spread article on Hilderstone, entitled "One of the Happiest Villages in Staffordshire – That's Hilderstone."

This is a snapshot of village life in the aftermath of a world war and in the early part of the second half of the Twentieth Century. The article begins:

"Hilderstone must surely be one of the happiest and most contented villages in Staffordshire – for in this agricultural community even the farmers have few complaints. One indeed makes the surprising claim that the weather is better than in most parts of North Staffordshire. Thunderstorms, he has noticed, 'often pass by the village' though he admits – rather reluctantly it seemed – that they do of course have a share of bad weather.

Whatever the merits of these meteorological observations, there is no doubt that the people love their village, and, quite properly, are proud of it, for it has quiet rural charm and is surrounded by rolling wooded pastures. But beauty and prosperity alone do not necessarily bring contentment and one may perhaps find the answer more in the warm-hearted friendliness of its inhabitants.

Hilderstone has little recorded history, no famed 'beauty spots', and few specimens of archaeological interest. It is just a good place in which to live – and, if one is agriculturally inclined, to work. Some of the inhabitants have found work in the towns, but few have left their homes in the village.

A short way from the village is Hilderstone Hall, which has had a profound influence on the life and development of the village. The present hall was built by Ralph Bourne at the beginning of the last century and it has remained in the Bourne family until four years ago, when the death of 94 years old Mrs Helen Bourne brought to a close a most important chapter in the village history. The Hall and the 600-acre estate, including five farms, were sold to Mr John Sadler, Joint Managing Director of James Sadler and Sons Ltd of Burslem. The old regime, which had lasted a century and a half, had ended, and a new one had begun – a matter of great significance in the life of the village.

One thing Mr Sadler and his wife have quickly acquired is a deep pride in Hilderstone and the Hall, and a sincere interest in the wellbeing of the village and its people. Since assuming ownership, Mr Sadler, who is Officer Commanding No 45 Gliding School, Meir, has been carrying out an extensive programme of modernisation and improvement of estate properties, which include five farms and seven cottages. Four of the five farms are tenanted and the fifth he is farming himself, with a bailiff, Mr F Fox. Like most farms in the area, it is 'mixed' farming, but an unusual feature for the district is the presence of more than 500 pigs".

Mr Sadler goes on to explain the historical importance of the hall and how, with the aid of the North Staffordshire Field Club, he strove to find something of the hall's obscure history (see part Twenty-One).

The article continues: "As always, the Hall today remains prominently identified with many phases of the village life and

activities. Mrs Sadler is President of the Hilderstone Women's Institute – a thriving and active body – and the Enrolling Member of the Mothers' Union. In spite of her domestic duties, work in helping to run the estate, and the service she gives to a number of organisations, she still finds time to execute some superb petit point embroidery for use on dining room chairs, and has recently taken up oil painting - a hobby to which she is bringing the same enthusiasm and imagination.

Mrs Sadler does not find living in the country at all quiet or dull, as many townspeople seem to imagine. "Town life is peaceful compared with the country" she says. "Every night there is some activity – whist drives, film shows, efforts and meetings of various organisations".

Close to the Hall is Christ Church, built in 1833 [sic]. It is of stone, with a tower at the west and surmounted with a 40 feet high spire. Patron of the living is Mrs G Candy, formerly of Walton House, Stone, who recently left the district to live in London. She is the daughter of the late Mrs Bourne, of Hilderstone Hall.

Vicar for the past four years has been the Rev E H Fernie, who came to Hilderstone from Yorkshire, though for 25 years previously he had been ministering in Australia. He is no stranger to the district, however, for his father was the late Dr Edward Fernie, who was in medical practice in Stone for 47 years. Mr Fernie states that the church was built by Ralph Bourne, whose nephew, Rev Bourne Baker, was the first vicar. The nephew had built the vicarage - a large and imposing building with a faintly continental look – and went to

reside there, to the apparent displeasure of his uncle who wanted him to live at the Hall.

Mr Fernie is a bachelor and has two dogs of whom he is obviously very fond. Asked if he did not find the vicarage rather large for his bachelor needs - it has some 16 rooms – he replied vigorously: "Not at all. I like plenty of room – and big rooms". He points out that meetings are often held at the Vicarage, and that the local amateur dramatic society rehearse there before putting on their productions in the school.

The vicar is proud of his village's dramatic society and thinks the talent is "extraordinarily good". He ought to know as he has had half-a-century's experience of running dramatic societies, not only in this country, but also in Australia. His verdict – "I think this society is the best I have ever had to deal with". And this in spite of the present lack of adequate facilities.

Hilderstone is a small parish – just over 400 people. The Vicar says the parishioners attend church very well. The village school was built about the same time as the Church. Here, under a headmistress (Miss Blant) and an assistant, about 40 junior children are trained. Senior children go to school in Stone. The Vicar's view is that 'It is quite a good little village school. Very satisfactory of its kind'.

I do find it the Vicar's comments rather amusing. I wonder if today's Ofsted reports use such language?

A Moving act of Remembrance

On a beautiful Autumn morning a silence fell upon the whole country, indeed much of the world, as we paused from our busy lives to pay tribute to those who fell during the First World War. Like communities throughout Britain, Hilderstone showed its collective thanks to those young men and women in a moving remembrance Service at Christ Church.

Festooned with poppies, the church was a beautiful tribute to all those who marched to war, and especially those who failed to return. Our boys from Hilderstone, whose names are engraved on the War Memorial, looked on from old photographs displayed in a thoughtful exhibition which had been placed at the entrance to the church, whilst their names were proudly displayed on poppies around the village and the church entrance.

Two silent Tommies stood sentinel in the churchyard, with hand-made poppies at their feet, a gift from the children of our Crafty Church Group, alongside crosses, bearing the names of loved ones lost through war. It set the scene for what was to be a very poignant act of remembrance.

By 10.45am, Christ Church was full, with the congregation representing our diverse community: those whose childhood had been directly affected by the loss of war, and those who are too young to fully

appreciate the pain of war but came to show their thanks. Whatever our age, experiences or beliefs, we were united in our act of remembrance.

This Remembrance Service saw the re-dedication of the War Memorial. For many years, this memorial had been tucked away at the entrance to the church, following its removal from the old school. Now, however, it has been re-sited in a more prominent location in the South Aisle, where it now stands with pride, decorated with poppies from the Tower of London and our own wreaths from the Parish Council and the Women's Institute.

There were many moving parts to this service, from Marion Baldwin's readings, Roy Clark's detailed presentation and the Reverend Marion's sermon, but perhaps worthy of special mention was the haunting sound of The Last Post. Positioned on the balcony, 10-year-old Zack Ireland's faultless rendition was truly memorable; the sound of the solo trumpeter reverberated throughout the church to mark the commencement of the Two Minute Silence. It was a strikingly poignant moment.

Comprising of private nativity scenes of all shapes, sizes and designs, this diverse collection will be displayed in the beautiful Georgian church of Hilderstone, as a reminder of the true meaning of Christmas and a celebration of our world-wide family.

Anyone wishing to share their tableaus with us is most welcome to do so. Whether they are home-made or shop-bought, old or new, we would love to exhibit them. Please ensure they are clearly labelled with your name, address and a contact number. Items can either be deposited at the Village Hall during the Coffee Morning on Saturday 8th December, or at Christ Church between 10-10.30am on Sunday 9th December.

The Exhibition will be open from 11am – 3pm on Sunday 9th December and will culminate in a specially-prepared 'Carols Around the Crib' service at 3pm, followed by mulled wine and, of course, mince pies!

Proceeds from this event will go to Staffordshire Women's Aid, which supports women and children who have fled, or still living with, domestic or sexual violence in Staffordshire Moorlands, Stafford Borough, Cannock District and South Staffs. Last year, alone, this charity responded to nearly 6,000 helpline calls, offered accommodation to 90 women and over 150 children in it refuges, and provided specialist support to more than 600 women and 200 children/young people. This, combined with its training of over 600 professionals on Domestic and Sexual violence, has established the Women's Aid as a vital service within our community.

Symbols of Christ

Christians have many symbols to represent what and who they are, all with a reference to Jesus. Here are just a few you can see:



First three letters of the name Jesus. Often used to mark a Christian building or object



The words that Pilate had put over the cross that crucified Jesus. Jesus of Nazareth, King of the Jews. When the Jewish leaders objected and wanted it changed to "he claimed to be the king of the Jews", Pilate refused their request.



Chi-Rho. Greek for the first 3 letters of Christ, or Christos, or Messiah, or God's anointed one. The one who would come as the Saviour of God's people



Icthcus – Greek for fish. Secret symbol used by the early church. Translates as "Jesus Christ, Son of God, Saviour



Crucifix or cruciform.

The crucifix shows Jesus death on the cross for our sins. The cruciform shows an empty cross as Christ has risen (as he promised!)

From the Vicar

As I write this on a dark and murky day, rain pouring and wind gusting, if I listen to the news on the TV or radio, I might be forgiven for asking myself: why on earth am I sending Christmas cards with peace on earth and goodwill to all written on them? What peace? What goodwill? What joy? What is there to celebrate? It all seems so dark and murky doesn't it? It was precisely the same over 2000 years ago in what we now call Israel – the people didn't think they had anything to celebrate – after all they were living under the harsh rule of their Roman conquerors weren't they? Where was God in their situation? And how often do we hear that same sentiment today. I give the same answer as I gave when I was asked a similar question after 911: God is there with you, crying with you, sharing the pain, angry and frustrated. Why? Because it is not God who is perpetrating the evil we see and hear about all around us; it is man. As a Christian, John 3:16 is my lynchpin: "God so loved the world that he sent his only Son". That is what Christmas is really all about.

At the end of November the church begins its new year, as always, with the season of Advent. Advent is one of two penitential seasons in the church (the other being Lent) when Christians particularly think about how far we fall short of what God would like us to be and we ask for His forgiveness. We look forward to celebrating Christ's first coming as a baby (at Christmas) and we also look forward to his promised second coming at some time in the future which only God knows when every tear shall be wiped from our eyes and death shall be no more as we are told in Revelation 21. At the end of Advent we have one of the two joyful seasons of the church – Christmas (just as we have Easter at the end of Lent). Christmas is the time when Christians remember, and thank God, that He loved the world so much that He was prepared to send his only son to show us a role-model for life. Christmas Day is the time when we give thanks for the birth of the divine Jesus as a human being, to a human family. We will be celebrating Advent, Christmas Night and Christmas Day. Everyone is welcome to come and join us for any, or all, of the services. Who knows, if you do, then maybe you, too, will experience the love of God in your life this Christmas. May God bless you and all you love at this special time of year.

6 oz soft light brown sugar 4 oz butter 4 tblspns golden syrup 2 tblspn black treacle 1lb plain flour 2 good tspns ground ginger ½ tspn bicarbonate of soda 1 beaten egg

Put the butter sugar and syrups into a saucepan and stir over a gentle heat until dissolved. Sieve together the flour, bicarb and ginger, into a bowl. Mix in the contents of the sauce pan and then the egg to form a smooth dough.

Turn out on to a floured surface.

Roll out to a ¼ inch thick and cut with shape cutter of your choice.

Why not make a ginger bread house. Use the cardboard from an old cereal box to make templates for walls and roof.

When your shapes are ready put them on a non-stick baking sheets.

Cook for 20 mins gas 4 or 170 to 180 degrees centigrade. When cooked transfer to cooling wires until cool.

Decorate with water icing and sweets.

This recipe makes quite a lot of gingerbread !! So you might want to only do half quantity !


