#### Kids' Corner: Craft Ideas for Autumn

Autumn is all about jumping around piles of crunchy colourful Autumn leaves and collecting pinecones and acorns. So why not use some of your cones to help the birds in your garden?

#### Bird cake mixture:

Packed full of energy to keep birds going, especially important in cold weather, this mixture is quick, easy and fun to make. You can use a wide range of ingredients, such as:



- sunflower hearts
- peanut pieces and other bird seed mixes
- dried fruits softened with water
- crumbled or grated cheese
- cooked rice and other leftovers
- breadcrumbs.

#### Things to avoid

- uncooked rice
- salted nuts or other foods
- whole nuts or fruit.

#### Method:

Combine your chosen ingredients in a bowl and add softened lard or dripping and mix together into a firm paste.

Tie a piece of string around the bottom of the cone (the fat bit) – you will use this to hang the fat cone from your tree, bird table etc.

Now take your bird cake mixture and press it between the cones, building it up in layers.

You are now ready to hang them up outside. Why not try using yogurt pots, small garden pots or coconut shells too?

## Homemade Toffee Apples

#### Ingredients

- 15 Apples
- 400g Golden Caster Sugar
- 350g Golden Syrup
- 350ml water
- 15 Lollipop Sticks
- 8 drops red food colouring (optional)

#### Method

- Lightly grease a few baking trays. Insert lollipop sticks into the whole, stemmed apples
- In a medium saucepan over medium-high heat, combine sugar, golden syrup and water. Heat to 149 - 154° or until a small amount of syrup dropped into cold water forms hard, brittle threads. Remove from heat and stir in food colouring.
- Holding the apple by its stick, dip in syrup and remove and turn to coat evenly.
- Place on prepared trays to harden.

#### SCARECROW WEEKEND:

As well as hosting an array of visiting scarecrows in our churchyard, we will also be holding our Family Scarecrow Service, during which we will present a slideshow of all your fabulous creations. With the Art Exhibition displayed around the church also, it will be a lovely celebratory event for our village.

Feel free to dress up as a Scarecrow for the service and head over to the Village Hall in the afternoon, where the celebrations continue.

#### HARVEST:

We have all been reminded over recent weeks about just how crucial farming is to this country, and indeed the world. Traditionally Christ Church has focused on fresh, tinned, or dry good and flowers at this service of thanksgiving. This year, however, we are planning something a little different.

In addition to the donations of food and flowers, we are looking to present the 'Tools of Occupation' in recognition of all the jobs people in our village do,



and the tools they require to do them. For instance, a student may use a calculator, pencils, note pad or laptop etc.

Can you help us to decorate our church for this important event by bringing along something which you use for your work or even hobbies? We are planning to decorate the church on Friday 16<sup>th</sup> & Saturday 17<sup>th</sup> September so any donations you can bring on either Friday or Saturday would be most gratefully received. You can also bring produce to the service itself.

All produce and flowers will, as usual, be auctioned off for charity at our annual Harvest Supper on Monday 19th September.



We start Christmas in style with the CHRISTMAS TREE FESTIVAL in the church on 10th & 11th December. Like last year, our beautiful Georgian church will be a riot of colour, with a host of decorated Christmas Trees twinkling away, and Christmas decorations

#### CRIB SERVICE:

This marks the beginning of Christmas for many of us, with the candles lit, Carols sung and, of course, mulled wine and mince pies at the end. This family service is always a popular event with families of all ages and we look forward to welcoming you to this special service, which starts at **4pm** on Christmas Eve.

Families are at the heart of all our services at Christ Church, with a dedicated Children's Corner available with toys, crayons etc for small children. Please do feel free to join us at one of our services, especially our Family Services.

#### The Future for Christ Church

Christ Church is not alone in trying to recover from the difficulties of Covid, but we find ourselves facing two additional challenges at present: the appointment of a new Incumbent; and the installation of a toilet in church.

The appointment of a new Vicar. This will be a HOUSE FOR DUTY post, as it was with the Rev'd Marion Reynolds. The Incumbent will provide 1.5 days per week for Hilderstone and 1.5 days per week for Fulford. The Incumbent will live at the Vicarage in lieu of a payment.

In early 2022 we completed our Parish Profile, a copy of which is available in the church, or on request. This sets out who we are and what we wish from a new Incumbent, with the aim of attracting applicants for our Benefice of Hilderstone with Fulford. The appointment was advertised in the Church Times in July, but without success, so the next stage is to advertise again in late September, with interviews scheduled for October. In the meantime, Christ Church continues to function as normal, with Audrey Stringer (Church Warden) inviting locum retired Vicars to officiate each Sunday. Those attending are finding this to be interesting, as we have benefitted from a rich variety of styles and sermons over the months.



The second challenge we face is providing toilet facilities in the church, as part of our Access for All project (Afa). The Chancellors office at Lichfield approved the Faculty for this work back in 2021 and the architects completed detailed drawings and gained tenders in the order of £50k for the installation of the toilet. However, sadly following the financial difficulties experienced during two years of Covid, where we were unable to do any fundraising, we do not have the funds required to go ahead with the works.



The early part of the Project to create an access for all via the car park to the Baptistery is almost complete (SEE PREVIOUS PAGE and LEFT). This cost approx. £14k and was gained through donations and fund-raising activities. We are most grateful to all those who supported us and enabled us to put this permanent ramp and access point into the church.

You may ask why we need a toilet, especially given the cost. It is evident from all clergy visiting the church that

there is not a future unless the church has a toilet. For many planning a wedding or funeral, having such facilities is a requirement, especially when the event is to be attended by those with an infirmity or very young children. Without facilities we are, in effect, often preventing people from attending events or the family will choose a more suitable venue where such facilities are offered. It also limits the events we can host at this beautiful Georgian church, impacting our ability to undertake necessary fundraising and social events for our community.

I am sure everyone in Hilderstone would wish the future of Christ Church to continue with a new Incumbent. To attract applicants, however, we have to show we are an active and thriving church community, but this is hindered by our lack of basic facilities. We have done well to maintain the church fabric and churchyard, and all the other financial overheads involved in running a historic church during these difficult times, but we must look to the future and what we need to offer our community if we are to continue to serve the village.

The churchyard was looking wonderfully colourful during July & August, with the bright orange and yellow hues of the



delightfully named 'Foxes & Cubs' (pictured RIGHT). For the past two years, we have also seen the rather rare fungus 'Pink Wax Cap' too which, though short-lived, are worth looking out for in October.

We are planning to allocate parts of the old churchyard area for a Wildlife haven for insects and animals who call it home. Amongst our visitors this year is an owl, which has taken up residence in the Bell Tower!

## Helping our Garden Friends in Autumn

During Autumn, we busy ourselves preparing for Winter by clearing the garden, de-cluttering the greenhouse and clearing up all those fallen leaves. Our wildlife friends are also busy in our gardens: Hedgehogs are looking for a place to hibernate, insects are hunkering down in the undergrowth and birds are flocking to our garden feeders. It's time to give them a special pre-Winter boost to help them through the cold season.

- Clean and refill bird feeders. Cleaning bird feeders is vital to preventing the spread of diseases. Scrub your feeders with soap and boiling water and rinse thoroughly. Allow to dry and fill with high-calorie winter foods such as fat balls. Don't forget to keep your birdbath full and free of ice.
- 2. Make compost. Decomposing organic waste produces a nutrient-rich and biologically active substance, which can be added to the soil, giving your flower beds a much-needed boost. The heat the pile generates will also provide the perfect winter home for insects and reptiles.
- 3. Clear out nest boxes. Every couple of years or so, it helps to empty out tit and sparrow boxes to clear them of parasites. If you can, remove the box from the tree, give it a quick sploosh with boiling water, leave to dry and then put back up again.



- 4. Feed hedgehogs. Hedgehogs are preparing to hibernate. So now is the time to put out some dry (non-fish) cat food or specialist hedgehog food. This will help them gain the weight they need to hibernate safely.
- Make a leaf litter pile. Even a simple leaf

litter pile will make a great winter home for insects, or maybe even a hedgehog. Leave a small doorway in the bottom to allow access for hedgehogs.

What garden projects will you be doing this autumn in your wildlife garden?

#### Jobs in the Garden: Autumn

Autumn is always a busy time for gardeners as we prepare for Winter and the Spring ahead. Here are a few jobs to be getting on with before Winter sets in:

- Raise plant pots off the ground to prevent them getting waterlogged.
- Tidy up your greenhouse before you overwinter tender plants, remove everything from your greenhouse, sweep out and disinfect the area, including the inside of the glass. A hot solution of garden disinfectant or Jeyes Fluid will help to prevent pests and fungal infection.
- Clean the glass, allowing maximum light in during shorter Autumn days.
- Clean your empty garden pots, with a mix of water and bleach and leave outside to dry ready for use next year.
- Rake up and store leaves to create valuable leaf mould. Worms love it
  and drag it down into the earth where it improves soil structure and
  water retention. You can also mix it with potting compost for a
  nutrient-rich start for plants. Best of all, it's free.
- Dig up annuals and plant your beds with pansies and/or wallflowers.
   Cut back faded perennials to 5 cm above ground level. Don't be too tidy

   seed heads are great for insects.
- Once your borders are clean and tidy, spread a thick layer of compost, bark chips or well-rotted manure.
- Clear out last year's compost and use it around the garden, making



room for this year's waste. If your compost isn't quite ready, turn it to improve decomposition, and start a new compost heap for this year.

- Warm soil and cooler air temperatures make Autumn the perfect time to fill gaps in your borders with evergreens, including Box, Laurel etc.
- Last, but not least, clean all your tools, sharpen (where necessary) and store away ready for a busy Spring.

## Hilderstone Heritage: Part 38



To start, two similar views of the centre of the village taken at different times - c1905 (LEFT) and the 1940s (BELOW LEFT): In Part Thirty-Seven we looked at Cotwalton Camp.



My sister has a log she made when she attended the camp (at age 14) 7th -14th May 1971. This is her campcraft badge (BELOW RIGHT): By 1971 at least three of the original huts were in use as showers, common room, and dining room respectively. Visitors

to the camp used tents. Hilderstone brook featured prominently in the week of activities:

"We all went down to the stream. We climbed the ropes and were swinging across the stream. We went into the marshy ground, and we paddled in the stream."

"We went for a walk to the Petrefactions where there is a waterfall running over the rocks. We went through Cotwalton and through the fields to the river [sic]. We were paddling in it and were walking under the waterfall. Some girls slipped down the rocks into the water. Nearly all of us got soaked."



"We went to the stream further along from the commando course and put our tents up. After lunch we all went down to the commando course. We were swinging on the ropes and some girls were climbing the ladder and worked themselves along the ropes, then they jumped into the stream. Quite a few girls had their costumes on."

"We walked down toward Cotwalton. We turned off along a little lane through some nurseries [Boulton's] and fields until we came to the main road. After eating lunch we set off walking along the main road. Then we turned off down a small lane. We walked through some nurseries [Hill's], then we came to the main road leading to Moddershall. We walked into Moddershall and had a look at the lake. Then we sat down by a stream. Some girls had a paddle in it."



The girls also went on trips to the Dane Valley, and to Aston where they canoed on the canal. On both occasions they went via minibus. Years earlier school related journeys from the village would undoubtedly have been via a coach owned by the Greatorex family. This photograph dates from the late 1940s / early 1950s. The family name features on the bus: The nearest railway stations to the village were Aston-by -Stone and Cresswell (LEFT). The latter was opened on 07/08/1848 and closed to passengers on 07/11/1966. It also served as a terminus of the Cheadle Branch line between 1892 and 1963.


